A Journey Toward Wholeness in Retirement Living

A mother mouse and a baby mouse were walking along when suddenly a cat attacked them. The mother mouse shouted "BARK!" and the cat ran away. "See?" the mother mouse said to her baby. "Now do you see why it's important to learn a foreign language?"

"RETIREMENT" is a foreign language for which I began preparations after my wife of over 42 years passed. In mid September 2016, I remet a lifelong friend and we were married shortly before my retirement. My last day of work in Tekamah, NE was January 31, 2018. I worked 70 plus two weeks. (43 1/2 years of ministry). Since then the rhythm and structured flow of work is often missed and has been replaced by flexibility of time and discoveringnew interests and challenges. My wife, Betsy, and I are still merging out two household furnishing into our home in Chincoteague, VA. We also serve as full time caregivers for Betsy's mom, Evelyn, 94, which takes us on trups between VA and our hometown, Monroe, NY for doctors and events with both families. We miss our Nebraska friendsand enjoy new friends and high school ones in VA and NY.

I am thankful or the help moving toward this stage of my life, particularly the Board of Pensions retirement seminar - "Growing Into Tomorrow...Today" (the seminar is worth attending), Kris Peterson, and my wife Betsy, a ruling elder, and elementary school teacher, who retired 10 years before me.

Kris Peterson of LIncoln, a John Maxwell Associate, formerly on our presbytery staff, helped me to challenge myself to create a brief personal "elevator" statement by prodding - "Who is Duncan outside the role of pastor?" Here's my vision & mission - "My heart is to grow relationships in faith, and social settings through teaching and mission." That is providing direction for me.

Ah retirement!!! The big thing for me is sitting and holding Betsy's hand in worship in Chincoteague rather thn being half a sanctuary away from her. We are both incolved in the Eastern Shore (VA) Emmaus Walk three-day spirtual journey and have done our fourht day which qualifies us to be team leaders. Betsy has been a women's team leader for years while I qualified to be a men's team leader last year. We both sing in the praise worship team of Christ United Methodist Church in Chincoteague, VA and work in that church's mission ("Manna Cafe") offering free meals every Monday to build community and provide for those in need of a meal. When we are in Monroe, we sing in the church choir (traditional music) which I left in 1966 for college in Scottsbluff, NE. In the last week of June, we travel to Rumney, NH for "Servants Camp," an intergenerational work week to reclaim a neglected 500-acre camp for Jesus and Christian camping.

Initiailly, it was surprising when people said to me... "Congratulations on your retirement!" In my emotional mind - Why would anyone congratulate me on leaving what I loved doing as a Pastor? On further reflection, the "call" to serve the Lord remains. Betsy came up with a mission statement for us - Our joint mission is to serve the Lord by sharing love and understanding and help where we can.

I enjoyed a supportive Session and congregation in Tekamah, Homestead Presbytery in several capacities, and the Tekamah community. The church is involved in the community (Lions Club, school functions, church community council, fire dpeartment, chamber of commerce, etc.) A gracious thanks to Doc Wyatt and Kris Peterson for a wonderful trip to Scotland too. (I could live in Edinburgh.)

In May 2015, Homestead Presbytery traveled to Tekamah. At that time you experienced the warm hospitility of our church - not just the ooks and the pastor. Remember at that time - the Logos Ministry kids singing, the to men who displayed their antique cars near the front door, The Presbyterian Women's display, the prayer shawl ministry, greeters at the doors (inside & out), a youth helping to serve communion, and the praise band! It was an intergenerational worship. (We sang..."I am the church, you are the church, we are the church together," by Avery & Marsh).
