#### HOMESTEAD IS SEEKING A STATED CLERK



The other day I walked into the kitchen and paused. I slowly turned a full circle looking at the counters, the cabinets, the stove, the refrigerator, the pantry door, the peninsula, the dishwasher, the sink, the kitchen window. Why had I stepped into the kitchen? What had I intended to do in that space? I refilled my coffee cup and walked out of the kitchen not sure why I



had ever walked into the kitchen. If it was important, I hoped I would remember my purpose for arriving in that place.

Most of us encounter this situation at some point in our lives; for some of us, it is a daily occurrence. We walk into the kitchen and can't remember why we are there. What did we intend to do?

While we all have likely experienced this why-did-l-come-in-here type of forgetfulness, I wonder if this also happens to us concerning our life's mission. I know it has happened to me. Being people of vocational ministry, we seldom discuss the questioning within us when we ponder why we ever stepped into vocational ministry. We shy away from the nagging realization that we can no

longer remember what it was we had intended to do. It is likely that, at some point, we find ourselves slowly turning in a full circle, taking inventory of our lives, trying to remember our purpose.

This wondering and questioning is normal, especially in times of upheaval, conflict, and/or stress. Our current society is experiencing all of these struggles. As anxiety has increased within our culture, so has conflict and divisiveness. And as one of my colleagues stated, "Clergy are easy targets" for those who are anxious, fearful, and angry. When ministry colleagues gather, the conversation regularly turns to speculation concerning the future for our churches; sometimes, the focus is broader and the discussion poses the question: Will Christianity, and religion in general, survive? It is only natural that many who are serving within the religious and spiritual arenas of our society are wondering why-did-l-come-in-here.

The uncertainty and questioning that comes with any seismic shift in our culture provides an opportunity for each of us to go deep and examine our core, our center, our purpose. Intentionally taking time to evaluate and consider our past and where we've been can remind us of our deepest sense of mission. Do you remember when you first sensed that the Divine had a "call" for your life, that your reason for living was bigger than you, that you were being invited to partner with this Everloving Presence? What did your heart feel drawn towards? What caused you to feel fully alive? What were the values to which you longed to give your life?

Getting back to our deep sense of purpose can guide us when we are in uncharted territory. As we grapple with our purpose and passion, I wonder – will we discover renewed energy for our calling? I wonder – will we have creative thinking for ways to live out our mission in a society that is experiencing such a seismic shift? I wonder – will the clarity of our purpose encourage freedom to embrace new ways of living out our vision? I wonder – will the clarity of our purpose give us permission to release the former practices that are no longer helpful? Knowing our core, our center, our purpose might breathe fresh air into our souls.

If you would like help in re-discovering your purpose, we are here for you. Spiritual direction, clergy coaching, or the 2-day Developmental Assessment program can aid you in discerning your mission. I know that sounds like a commercial ... because it is ... but it's also OUR purpose. We, at LeaderWise, do what we do because this is our core, our center, our purpose – to foster healthy and spirit-filled lives of service.

# Bending the Moral Arc: Webinar to learn about a small group model for anti-racism

Two congregations came together in partnership around the invitation of Matthew 25 to have courageous conversations and to take steps towards dismantling structural racism. They were transformed!

We will hear from these churches, one predominately white and one historically black, that developed a small group model for conversation and action, all during the pandemic and on zoom! Leaders from Nassau Presbyterian Church and



Witherspoon Street Presbyterian Church in Princeton, New Jersey will be present to share their story and best practices as you learn to translate this model to your own context.

A template for this small group ministry partnership has been created and will be available as a FREE download during this webinar. Background, tips for creating your own ministry and sample lessons and resources will be included. There will be break-out groups and a Q and A.
