

As one particular election was rapidly approaching and there were no pending assignments, I posted a random question to our discussion group: "How would Jesus vote?"
Only one student dared touch that one. His response (omitting the hot-button words) was, "I think Jesus would vote for (Party A) because even though they support (Issue X) and (Issue Y), that's better than supporting (Issue Z). Not me, though. I vote (Party B)."
So, in short, he likely would have voted against Jesus if he were running for office.

It can be confusing and rather frustrating at times trying to figure out how to vote, even during the midterms. But, as we approach Thanksgiving, we should be grateful that we have the opportunity to do so.

But, remember that no matter who wins any given election, what ballot initiatives pass or fail, or how messed up you believe things to be, that above all, God still has a plan for all of us. He has plans for us as individuals, as a city, state, nation, and world.

And because God is so good, we can rest assured that his plans for us are as well. Because God is omnipotent, or all-knowing, we can rest assured that his plans are bigger than we could imagine.

As Psalm 107:1 puts it, "Give thanks to the LORD, for he is good; his steadfast love endures forever." There is nothing we can do that would ever bar us from God's love. No mistake we could ever make, no sin we could ever commit, no vote we could ever cast, no judgment in which we could ever err...no amount of time could pass, no distance is too far —nothing will ever keep us from God's love. And that's saying something because we all have done things we're not proud of in this lifetime. Doesn't that make you want to go out
